HISTORY AND CHARISMS OF THE FIRST JESUITS: DISCOVERING OUR FRIENDS AND OUR FRIENDSHIP IN THE LORD

This 4-week course seeks to introduce students into a reflection on Ignatian spirituality with a selection of lesser-known first-person documents composed by Ignatius of Loyola and the first companions. These 16th century texts, studied in English translations, with their themes of friendship, studies, mission, and hope in God, perhaps read for the first time, can offer a new impetus to deepen our spiritual and theological reflection on these topics and others.

The program will take place at Hekima University College, a CTI member school. As part of the course and general program activities, students will learn from and engage with guest speakers from various CTI member schools and participate in local visits and activities that will enhance their understanding of the historical, cultural, and spiritual context of this year's host country, Kenya.
